The Future of our Parish

On Sunday 25th February the parish churches of Arrochar, Luss & Rhu & Shandon all voted in favour of becoming linked. This means that the three churches will share resources like a minister, currently Rev Ian Millar, whilst retaining their own autonomy with regard to finance etc.

Going forward we are now looking at the steps to be taken to move toward a union of the three churches to form the Three Lochs Parish which will reduce administration whilst still retaining weekly worship in the individual churches. We will be also looking at the actions we need to take to allow us to call a permanent minister.

Easter Services Easter Sunday 31st March

There will be an early morning service in the churchyard of Rhu and Shandon Church at 7am, followed by breakfast. All are welcome.

The 10am service in Arrochar Parish Church will, again, be followed by a walk to the cross at Glenloin, laying of flowers and a short prayer, after which we are invited to share light refreshments at the *Olive Branch*. Lifts can be arranged.

My Journey of Faith Rev. Ian Millar OLM

One of the things that drew my wife and me to Arrochar was the Church and the worshipping community which we found warm and friendly. I had been a lay minister in the Anglican church but accepted my days of leading services were probably over. My plans, however were not what the Lord was calling me to and shortly after we arrived Rev. Sherrard announced his retirement, an announcement which set me on a path that led to my ordination, in 2020, as an Ordained Local Minister (OLM) in the Church of Scotland.

The path was long and not always easy.

My preaching skills were exercised over a few months, guesting at Arrochar and Luss. During this time, I attended a vocations conference run by the Church of Scotland. Realisation dawned that I would need the support of Presbytery if I were to fulfil my calling. Fortunately, Presbytery felt there would be a rôle for me within the Church of Scotland and a lengthy period of training, encompassing many aspects of theological academic study, doctrine and scrutinisation of my faith ensued.

Throughout my journey of faith, my sense of call slowly evolved. Initially this was to the people of Arrochar and Luss, but as I became more involved with, and understood the role of Presbytery better it seemed that more experienced people led by the Spirit would have a better sense of where my developing skills would be of most benefit. I was placed with the Rev Christine Murdoch in the Lochside Linkage, comprising Craigrownie, Garelochhead and St Modan's Parish Churches. It was exciting; school visits, pastoral visits, ecumenical meetings, and then very shortly after there was the COVID lockdown. How were we to be a Church, how were congregations to come together to worship God and provide support for each other?



In the Church we quickly learned how to use existing technology to ensure services were available on-line. I learned so much about recording, editing, and publishing short services to Facebook and You Tube and how to update Web sites. A whole new area of learning.

During these four years, thanks to Dr Grace Rogerson, Interim Moderator at Arrochar and Luss I was able to retain a limited link with my home parish conducting funerals and weddings. As the Presbytery Mission Plan took shape I was asked if I would consider returning to Arrochar and Luss with the addition of Rhu and Shandon. Of course, I said "Yes!"

A Reflection for Easter Rev. Ian Millar OLM

Worried, troubled, not sure where life is leading you?

There is so much going on in the world that might cause us to question what is happening.

I am fortunate to have lived in a country led by a strong monarchy and strong political leaders. The information we got was through newspapers, radio, and television, broadcast at set times. We did not suffer information overload. I am not mourning the passing of halcyon days when the sun always shone, it didn't. There were scandals then, as there are now.

The biggest difference seems to be the way and frequency 'news' is reported. I wonder how Jesus driving out the sacrificial animals and money changers from the temple would have been reported. It would certainly have been a talking point and that's how the news was spread, by word of mouth, a slower pace. We know from the epistles (letters) that news also spread through the written word, these were read to a group of people and then potentially forwarded to another group. It gave people time to think and consider before making comment.



This Lent, I have had a stronger sense

of a fresh start than I can remember in any previous season. It is closely aligned with the final years of the life of Jesus, compressed into the Lent and Easter period. It began with the Gospel of Mark and the urgency it evokes, the brief details of the baptism, the immediate urge to go into the wilderness, (Mk 1:9-13). The end of one chapter in the life of Jesus and the start of another, a fresh start, and miraculous things followed.

Amid these miracles, Jesus alerts his disciples to his impending death, he is preparing them for change, another beginning. Peter wants things to stay the same and is rebuked by Jesus, (Mk 8:31-33). The third week in Lent took us to the cleansing of the temple (Jn. 2:13-16). Another new beginning brought about by Jesus. The final readings for Lent – The light coming into the world (Jn. 3:16-21), the plant that grows from the grain (Jn 12:20-25) and the Passion (Mk. 15:37 -39), all speak of a fresh start. Taken together, the Lent readings lead us to the greatest fresh start ever, the resurrection of Jesus, the Christ, (Mk 16:1-8).

Christ died for us, for you and for me. He conquered death, rising on the third day and returned to God the Father where he intercedes on our behalf. In Jesus, we have someone who listens to our worries and our troubles and always offers us a fresh start. A start full of hope and promise as we are guided by the Holy Spirit. This Easter, take the chance of a fresh start, leave your worries and troubles at the foot of the cross and enjoy a fresh start in the risen Lord.

May Christ our Saviour always attend you, bless you and lovingly guide you.

May the glory and the promise of this joyous time of year bring peace and happiness to you and those you cherish.
