A sad story with a happy ending

Graveyard Project

Some seven years ago, with the blessing of David Pollard, the then Session Clerk, some of us undertook to record all the legible inscriptions, particularly of the oldest headstones, as it was apparent that, all too soon, many of them would be unreadable.

Since then, we have occasionally been asked to locate long forgotten family graves and these records, although incomplete, have often proved invaluable; but not when Alan Nimmo received a request to help locate the grave of Malcolm Paton.

Malcolm's story

Malcolm, or Callum as he was known, was the youngest son of artist Sir Joseph Noël Paton FRSA.

The large family often enjoyed holidaying by Loch Long and in the summer of 1879 were staying at Ardgartan House. One evening Callum fell ill with a fever and sore throat. The usual available remedies proved ineffective. A doctor was summoned, who diagnosed diphtheria. Despite the best efforts of all the family little Callum died on 20th September aged just five years and seven months.

His father recorded in his diary that Callum was buried in Arrochar and his grave was marked by 'a simple cross'.

So, this was all the information we had — 'a simple cross'. In 1879 the burial would have been in the part of the churchyard to the south of the church, but graves in this section often appear randomly located. Chris Fowler and I walked the area scrutinising all the 'simple crosses' in the hope that perhaps one inscription had been missed. That proved not to be the case. Perhaps the cross was broken, or there was no inscription. Eventually Chris came upon what appeared to be parts of a cross. On closer examination there were four pieces; a base, two parts of a cross, and a rectangular slab with, apparently, no inscription. Carefully, moving the slab slightly away from the wall of the



old church, where it rested, we were delighted to be able to read the inscription:

Malcolm Campbell Noel Paton Died 20th September 1879 Aged 5 years and 7 months

I contacted Cat Berry, Sir Joseph's great-great granddaughter, who had instigated the search, and told her of our success. It would be fair to say that it was an emotional moment for all of us.

Recently, Cat, came to Arrochar. She was able to see the church where her family had worshipped almost 150 years ago and visit the grave of this little boy.

Chris and I are happy to have been able to bring the family together again.
